

Cost Share Septic Incentives for Danforth Pond Waterfront Homeowners *for waterfront homes within 250 feet of the water's edge*

Eligibility Requirements for Routine Septic Maintenance Rebate:

1. The 2024 Danforth Ponds Septic Questionnaire must be completed prior to receiving a rebate. To complete the survey - <https://forms.gle/BJNKTeVbodL2oYMZ9>
2. A limited amount of funding is available. Homeowners should verify the availability of funding prior to scheduling services.
3. Funding is available for residential year-round or seasonal homes, only.
4. Only one rebate for routine maintenance (pumping or inspecting) per property.
5. A Request for Rebate Form with a paid receipt must be submitted prior to reimbursement.

Cost Share Incentives for Routine Septic Maintenance

Eligible households will receive a rebate that will cover up to:

- **33% of the cost to pump a system**, not to exceed \$100, **OR**
- **50% of the cost of an inspection**, not to exceed \$200

Eligibility Requirements for Septic Replacement or Repair Grant:

1. Funding is available for residential year-round or seasonal homes, only.
2. Preference will be given to replacing systems deemed an elevated risk to water quality such as cesspools or holding tanks.
3. A Septic System Evaluation and Certification Form must be completed by a licensed New Hampshire Septic Evaluator/Inspector and submitted with the required application.
4. An application form must be submitted for consideration. Please refer to the Application instruction for additional eligibility requirements.

Cost Share Incentive for Septic System Repair or Replacement

Funds will be dispersed to eligible households in the form of a grant that will cover up to:

- **33%, not to exceed \$5,000**, toward the cost for replacing or repairing an outdated septic system that is in failure or close to failure. ****Please Note – Preference will be given to septic replacement****
